

Cyber Loss Data



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

The Challenging Issues

- What are the primary issues that cause you concern?
 - Cyber threat landscape
 - Evolving malware; encryption attacks
 - Social engineering
 - Non-cyber threat landscape
 - Privacy incidents
 - Impermissible disclosures
 - How do you prioritize competing responsibilities?

Regulatory Enforcement

- How have OCR enforcement actions affected your allocation of resources?
- How have state enforcement actions affected your allocation of resources?
- What are your primary continuing concerns about regulatory enforcement actions?

The Human Firewall

- How are you protecting your networks from the evolution and sophistication of social engineering?
 - Administrative, physical and technical measures
- How are you deploying employee training?
 - Interactive learning
 - Reward based learning
 - Sanction based learning

Third Party Risk Management

- What are the issues?
- How are you addressing them?
 - How are you conducting due diligence?
 - What contractual measures have you taken?
 - Information security standards
 - Limitations of liability
 - Indemnification
 - Cyber insurance

Incident Response Planning

- How often do you review your plan?
- How often do you "test" your plan?
- Which business units outside information technology/security/privacy are involved?
- Is it mapped to an information security framework? i.e. NIST SP 800-61 Rev. 2
- What have been the tangible benefits?

Cyber Insurance

- Is acquisition and/or renewal incorporated in incident response planning?
- How has cyber insurance responded to:
 - Data privacy and/or data security incidents?
 - Intellectual property matters?
 - Insider hacking matters?
- What issues would you like cyber insurance brokers and carriers to better understand?
 - Issues unique to health care
 - Level of support during incident
 - Patient remediation

Health Care is (and has been for many years) in the middle of massive change:

- Affordable Care Act
- M&A
- Cost-cutting (while maintaining patient safety/care as priority #1)
- New relationships/Partners
- Politics
- New Administrations





Health Care has "a lot on its plate"

- Changing laws
- Related reimbursement shifts from Medicare/Medicaid
- Providers (especially hospitals) fighting against reduced revenue on most all fronts





Health Care has "a lot on its plate"

- Move to Value-Based Care; Related diversion of BOD and overall organization strategic focus
- Ongoing M&A activity between Healthcare organizations (i.e., Anthem/CIGNA)
- Resulting vulnerability to both IT and HR integration/business procedures (increased disclosure points)





Health Care #1 Priority Historically (and still today): Patient Safety

- Arguably at odds with BOD focus resources on privacy/cybersecurity issues
- Accessibility to data is KEY for patient care BUT: trade-off against data security
- Management traditionally focused on clinical issues & patient safetycentric agenda more than privacy/security issues





Current Regulatory Developments & What's on the Horizon...

- Cybersecurity Task Force Report mandate per Cybersecurity Act of 2015
- Draft to Senate & House committees May 15, 2017
- Call to Gov't to create new framework of policies, guidelines
 & best practices for HealthCare industry
- Build off of NIST & HIPAA Security Rule existing frameworks
- Recommends a "CyberSecurity Leader" role in HHS





Current Regulatory Developments & What's on the Horizon...

- Aggressive Oversight: OCR, FTC, State AGs, DOJ, OIG, FCC,
- OCR 14 Settlements to Date (2017): \$14M CMP
- LabMD (FTC)
- Horizon BCBSNJ (NJ AG)





Recent OCR Settlement/ Developments: 2017 To Date

- 7 OCR Settlements totaling \$14.3M in CMP
- •3 Settlements Just Last Month April, 2017 (A First for OCR)





Recent OCR Settlements

BioTelemetry, Inc. (fka, CardioNet, April 2017) – \$2.5M

Center for Children's Digestive Health/CCDH ("Tummy Docs" April, 2017)- \$31K

Metro Community Provider Network (April, 2017) – \$400k

Memorial Health Care System (Feb. 2017) - \$5.5M





Recent OCR Settlements

Children's Medical Center of Dallas (Feb., 2017) \$3.2M

MAPFRE Life Insurance Co. of Puerto Rico (Jan. 2017) \$2.1M

Presence Health Network (Jan. 2017) \$475k





Recent OCR Settlements (2016)

\$2.7M CMP imposed against each CE (Failure to act on identified problems/risks)

- University of Mississippi Medical Center
- Oregon Health & Science University

St. Joseph Health - \$2.14M





Recent Fraud & Abuse Recovery

2014

\$2.425 Billion

2015

\$2.100 Billion

2016

\$2.597 Billion





2016 Fraud & Abuse Recovery

- •Government recovers about \$20.00 for every \$1.00 investment in recovery efforts
- •2016 was the seventh consecutive year where more than \$2.0 Billion recovered from health care fraud and abuse matters
- •On average 13.5 new qui tam cases are initiated each week
- Of these new cases, 71% are healthcare-related
- * False Claims Act (FCA) penalties doubled in 2016

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
